Opinion: Some Questions For SAF by Jim Coufal

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Fellow SAF'ers:

Below is a modified copy of a letter that I very recently sent to John Helms, president, Leo Lefeveriere, District VI council member, and Michael Goergen, executive vice-president. Leo forwarded it to Bob Malmshimer and Craig Vollmer and they asked me to send it to the *NY Forester* for publication.

Dear John, Leo, Mike, & SAF Council Members:

As usual after an SAF National Convention, I arrived home from Ft. Worth (with kudos to our Texas colleagues) all juiced up for forestry and the SAF. Before the fire turns to embers, I want to share some of my thoughts stimulated by the 2005 convention. This will largely take the form of questions:

1. Is it time to take a very serious look at changing the name of the SAF? I believe it was John Moser who suggested several years ago that the name "Society of American Forest Resource Professionals" be considered. This name brings up the question of technician membership, but any name change will suggest and even create unique problems.
2. Is it time to set aside or make a lower priority the concern with membership we have spent so much time and so many resources on over the past decade? Clearly, it is impossible to say what membership would be like now without the many outstanding efforts of the past 10+ years, but it is possible to say membership has declined significantly even with these efforts. I suspect that the issue has become old-hat to many SAF members, and further that the time and resources spent on membership might actually attract more members if they made SAF an organization of such note that foresters could not resist membership.
3. Have we acted to try to please as many as possible and to displease as few as possible rather than as a proactive organization, thus leading to decreased interest in SAF? For example, three state societies (NY, PA, and WV) recently commissioned studies of the quality of residual stands following harvest operations, studies that didn't get off the ground without a great deal of groaning and consternation.

Using a similar survey protocol, the results were basically alike in the three states, indicating that the majority of residual stands were the results of high-grading. I am not sure of the others, but NY went a step further and looked at the stands comparing those where a forester had been involved with those where no forester had been involved. The sad results were that having a forester involved largely made no difference.

Anecdotally, I have had foresters from many regions say they have similar high-grading situations in their area (and since writing this I have heard Maine SAF did a similar study to the three noted above, with similar results). When society accepts any discipline as a profession, it allows and

expects that the profession will police its own practitioners. Don't we owe it to society to see how widespread the problem of high-grading is? I suggest that where it exists SAF should be working to eliminate or ameliorate the problem, especially if foresters are contributing to the problem or at least not ameliorating it. And if a task force was promulgated to look into these questions, I further suggest that it would be wise to include non-foresters.

4. As we move toward more refined certification of foresters, should we look at the need, or lack thereof, to continue program accreditation in its present form? Accreditation could be awarded based on the percentage of graduates from any given college who pass the CF program, reducing costs to the educational programs and to SAF, while placing certification testing at the most appropriate level, the individual. Schools don't practice forestry, individuals do.

5. Isn't it about time to try some of the various ideas that were promulgated during the 1999 meeting of the SAF, Wildlife Society, American Fisheries Society, and others? For example, the sharing of select articles from the various journals, which also could be done electronically. Or joint memberships? And how has the Open Community Forum of the 2000 convention been followed-up?

6. Should SAF take the lead in establishing a "Foresters Without Borders" organization patterned after "Doctors Without Borders?" Perhaps better yet, SAF could engage our sister resource professions to form an even broader-based helping organization?

Not being in the loop at SAF means I may be writing about things that have already been addressed (since writing I have found out that Pres. Helms asked for and had another meeting with some of our sister resource profession societies). If so, I apologize. My sincere concern for forestry and the SAF nevertheless leads me to share these ideas with you in the hope that they will stimulate discussion and action.
